



Lymphoma screening

Thanks for bringing your pet in to see us. We performed a test that screens for a very common type of cancer, called lymphoma.

Test results: Not consistent with lymphoma

Your pet's results are not consistent with lymphoma at this time. This means that at this time, we don't have a reason to suspect lymphoma unless clinical signs develop. That's great news! Lymphoma screenings are recommended as part of annual wellness exams for dogs aged 7 and older and for at-risk breeds starting at age 4.

What does this mean?

Your pet is at an age or is a breed where cancer is more likely to occur.

A result not consistent with lymphoma does not rule out other forms of cancer, or a lymphoma diagnosis in the future. Your veterinarian might still recommend testing.

It's important to screen your pet for lymphoma regularly, according to your veterinarian's recommendation.

What can I do next?

Just keep your pet happy and healthy, and speak with your veterinarian if you notice any of the following:

- + Unusual lumps and bumps
- + Sores or open wounds that don't heal
- + Weight loss or loss of appetite
- + Vomiting or diarrhoea
- + Discharge or odor from the mouth, nose, or anus
- + Lack of interest in exercise and play or decrease in stamina
- + Mobility or stiffness issues
- + Difficulty breathing
- + Difficulty urinating or defecating
- + Any other concerns
